THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews 7.21–28

But this one became a priest with an oath, because of the one who said to him,

'The Lord has sworn and will not change his mind,

"You are a priest for ever" '-

accordingly Jesus has also become the guarantee of a better covenant.

Furthermore, the former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but he holds his priesthood permanently,

because he continues for ever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them. For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect for ever.

May your word live in us, and bear much fruit to your glory.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

All thanks and praise, glory and honour, be yours at all times, in every place, holy and loving Father, true and living God.

We praise you that through your eternal Word you brought the universe into being and made us in your own image.

You have given us this earth to care for and delight in, and with its bounty you preserve our life.

We thank you that you bound yourself to the human race with the promises of a gracious covenant and called us to serve you in love and peace.

Above all, we give you thanks for your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ:
born as one of us, he lived our common life and offered his life to you in perfect obedience and trust.

By his death he delivered us from sin, brought us new life, and reconciled us to you and to one another.

Therefore with angels and archangels, with apostles, and prophets, with holy women and men of every age, we proclaim your great and glorious name:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Holy God, we thank you

for these gifts of your creation, this bread and wine, and we pray that we who eat and drink them in obedience to our Saviour Christ, by the power of the Holy Spirit, may be partakers of his body and blood, and be made one with him and with each other in peace and love.

On the night he was betrayed Jesus took bread; and when he had given you thanks he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Take, eat. This is my body given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.'

After supper, he took the cup, and again giving you thanks he gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Drink from this, all of you.

This is my blood of the new covenant shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.'

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Therefore we do as our Saviour has commanded: proclaiming his offering of himself made once for all upon the cross, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming again, we celebrate, with this bread and this cup, his one perfect and sufficient sacrifice for the sins of the whole world.

As we eat and drink this holy sacrament, renew us by your Spirit that we may be united in the body of your Son and serve you as a royal priesthood in the joy of your eternal kingdom.

Receive our praises, Father,
through Jesus Christ our Lord,
with whom and in whom,
by the power of the Holy Spirit,
we worship you in songs of never-ending praise:
Blessing and honour and glory and power
are yours for ever and ever. Amen.

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray,

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins

Covid restrictions update

From Friday, 22 October, revised restrictions have come into force. The following is taken from Diocesan emails:

Resuming in-person services at St John's

- Only up to 20 fully vaccinated people can now meet indoors, in greater Melbourne, and up to 50 people outdoors.
- We anticipate indoor groups of up to 50 to be possible by 5 November.
- So, instead of going through the inconvenience of arranging for 20 people to book for this and next Sunday, the decision has been made to gear up for opening fully (up to 50 people per 'fully vaccinated' service) from **Sunday 7 November**. This will need to be confirmed closer to the time.
- This will give us time to establish new rosters with effect from 7 November, and ensure that all the required admin is compliant, as per the various details below.
- Since ALL the vaccination status surveys returned so far have shown that everyone will be fully vaccinated, all our usual schedule of services will be for fully vaccinated people only: Sundays 8am &10am, and Wednesdays 10am.
- If any unvaccinated people wish to attend a service, a said Eucharist with no music will be held every Saturday at 5pm, conducted by Fr John alone, from 6 November.

Checking vaccination status

- QR code access, linked to vaccination status is required.
- COVID check-in marshals must be in attendance and require people to produce vaccination evidence for the fully vaccinated services and ensure that 'all reasonable steps' are taken to ensure that people of unknown vaccination status do not enter a premises for such services.
- Such individuals also have an obligation not to enter.
- If a person is known not to be vaccinated, and they insist on entry, that person ought to be reported to authorities.
- Children under 16 are regarded as vaccinated, and children under 1 year old are counted as part of the attendance limit.
- Anyone with an official medical exemption is regarded as vaccinated. There are strict guidelines on medical exemptions and permanent exemptions are every rare. Authorised GPs must be consulted.

Vaccination records

- Vicars must keep a record of the vaccination status of all volunteers/workers, ie those with key roles in services: lay readers, musicians, technical operators, servers, clergy.
- The record notes only name, vaccination status, type of evidence, and who sighted it and when. Copies of the actual vaccine certificates are NOT kept.
- We do not keep the details of people attending services - only the workers/volunteers.

Service regulations

- The 1 person for every 4sqm of floor space rule applies to all activity on church sites.
- Masks must be worn indoors and outdoors apart from the one person speaking/leading/preaching at the time.
 There is no restriction on singing, other than wearing masks.
- Holy Communion is bread only or individual cups. The president should avoid droplets or aerosols over the elements and should distribute wearing a mask.
- Refreshments may be served after a service but the 4sqm rule applies to the space where refreshments are served and consumed, and people should be seated for refreshments, so they do not gather closely together. There must be no sharing of food or utensils.
- People from one service must have left the premises before people for another service arrive. There is no minimum cleaning requirement after each service, but cleaning toilets, door handles and other frequently touched surfaces often is recommended.

Newsletter #31 (from 17 October)

The latest newsletter, issue #31, dated for the week of 17 October 2021, has now been emailed, and posted for those who don't have email or who have requested a printed copy.

Kindly advise the office if you wish to be included in the emailing/posting lists.

Revision of Electoral Roll (repeated from last week)

The <u>electoral roll</u> is subtly different from the <u>parish</u> <u>directory</u> or <u>e/mailing list</u>: the directory lists all who want to be part of our parish life and agree to be listed in it, and the e/mailing list is for all who wish to receive parish communications.

The electoral roll is a list of parishioners who are entitled both to be nominated as office bearers, and to vote for them. To be on the electoral roll, you must be 18 or older, baptised, and formally a member of no other church community except St John's.

You also need to habitually attend worship at St John's - at least 12 times in the past 12 months. This condition has been difficult to achieve in a *measurable* way for both 2020 and 2021, although many people - parishioners, newcomers and visitors - have been viewing the weekly live-streamed services either at the time or later. The Diocese encourages parishes to exercise a very generous interpretation of the condition.

Most parishioners who were on the list last year will remain on the list for this year, unless they indicate otherwise, or there is an appropriate reason to remove them.

For anyone who wasn't on the roll last year, and would be entitled to be on it under non-covid circumstances (e.g. would normally have attended weekly services here over at least the last 3 months), let the parish office know promptly, and we will send you an electoral roll application form.

This revision must be completed by 13 November.
